Pulp Science Fiction - Pulp science fiction does not try to be literature. Pulp's lurid and ridiculous plots usually involve buxom damsels rescued by square-jawed, ray gun-toting heroes as they battle brutish monsters and spout god-awful dialogue. A science fiction magazine is a publication that offers primarily science fiction, ... The familiar image [citation needed] of pulp science fiction is a beautiful, scantily clad, large-breasted woman being carried off by a bug-eyed monster, but there were many classic stories first published in pulp magazines. These tubules contain fluid and cellular extensions of the pulp. The core of the tooth is the pulp, which contains blood vessels, nerve tissue, and other cells. The part of the pulp that travels down the root to connect with the systemic nerves and blood supply is called the root canal. Almost all of the few remaining pulp magazines are science fiction or mystery magazines now in formats similar to "digest size", such as Analog Science Fiction and Fact and Ellery Queen's Mystery Magazine. The format is still in use for some lengthy serials, like the German science fiction weekly Perry Rhodan (over 2,650 issues as of 2012).
